
iSmart: Exploring Smart and Connected Disaster Planning for Rural and Small Libraries Research Questions & Design

2. Who are the key participants within and outside of small and rural public libraries to be included in DPRR and COOP design, implementation, and evaluation? How do these stakeholders differ between library (micro), communities (meso), and state/national (macro) organizational levels? What is the process for public librarians to collaborate with key stakeholders at these levels?

3. How do disaster plans reflect the needs of vulnerable populations? How can GIS-informed services inform library policymaking? Which solutions are scalable and transferrable?

Disaster Management Barriers

- Staff impacted by disasters
- Convincing local gov't library is integral to disaster management
- Inadequate technology infrastructure
- Staff emergency roles vs day-to-day roles; lack of training
- Lack of generators
- Inadequate or no disaster plan
